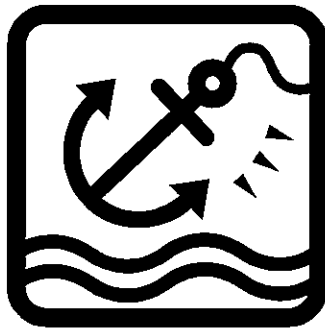


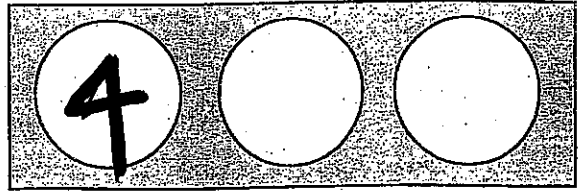

Stress and social life restrict both genders

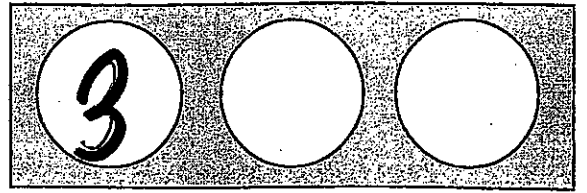

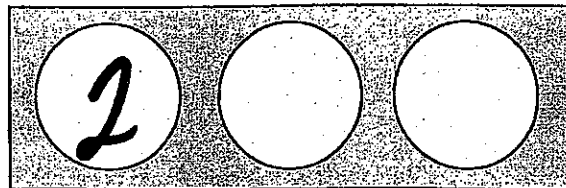

help people focus on work other than the opposite

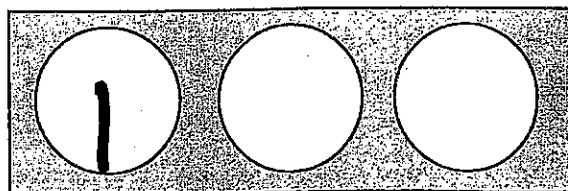
