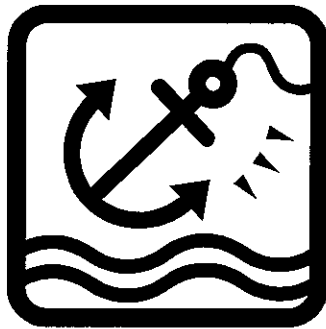


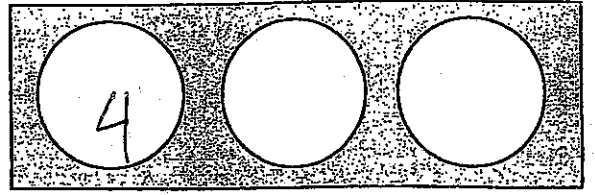

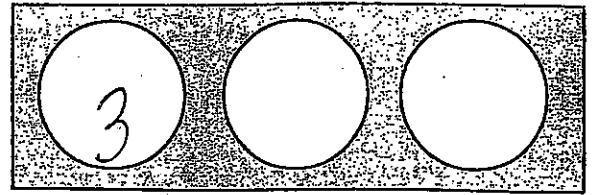

In my family, we have friends who are black, white, latino and asian. Though we treat them like any other guest in our house, there is always a time where my grandparents will turn on the news and give a stereotypical remark. "Blacks seem to always be too dangerous!" or "Whites are always getting into lawsuits!" My mom told me, "When you get older, you tend to hang out with your own kind." Does that sound like we're comfortable with other ethnicities and races? I don't think so. ^{and} Trust me, if it's happening in my family, it's happening in other families too.

Perhaps, there's equality and understanding in our city. You look at the schools and you see all these kids of different backgrounds and cultures. They get along, right? Wrong. There are exceptions to this thought, but have you ever looked around an Oakland school? The kids might have the same classes and go to the same school, but things change. At school, lunchtime, afterschool, Asians stick to the Asians and Blacks stay close to each other. 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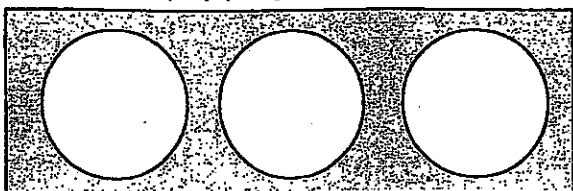

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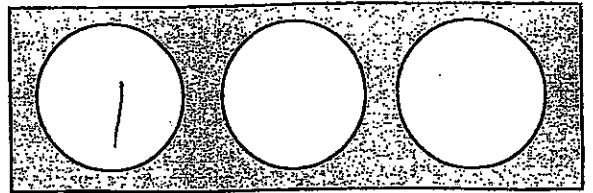
